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## HORSE PULL Tuesday, August 8th - 7 P.M.

Dan Byler (814) 573-1808 RULES \& REGULATIONS

1. Teams will stay in holding area during the pull.
2. Two hitchers allowed.
3. You may ride or walk, but you cannot change in the middle of a pull, if you start to ride, you must continue to ride on that weight.
4. In case of broken equipment and you have to have help, you must unhitch and come back to the boat.
5. 3 passes will be called a pull. If you make 3 passes on your first pull you must come back for a 3rd pull.
6. Distance to pull is $27-1 / 2$ feet.
7. Judges decision is final.
8. Animals must be healthy and no open sores or you will be asked to leave.

## RULES \& REGULATIONS

## General Rules

1. ALL EXHIBITORS agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of The Cochranton Community Fair.
2. THE FAIR management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
3. REASONABLE CARE will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the fair is not in any way to be held responsible for accidents, or loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
4. ENTRIES WILL be made according to classification.
5. PREMIUMS as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves.

The fair reserves the right to determine how many entries, they will accept from any exhibitor in the same class, or in the case of livestock, the same breed and poultry the same species.

The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time award is proven. In such case, the Superintendent, Management or Secretary of the fair or show or such referee as he may appoint may make the decision with his approval. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal. No judging on the Danish System.
6. IT SHALL be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock they are entering. Any item entered improperly, will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
7. ALL ENTRIES must be grown, produced or made in the County since the last fair. (Except where the fair accepts exhibits from other Counties or States).
8. CHAIR PERSONS of a department reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the Superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition, animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, produces and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
9. THE FAIR management may at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show, may be excluded. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the fair except by consent of the management.
10. EVERY EXHIBIT accepted for premiums must be given an entry tag which must be plainly marked, showing the name of the exhibit. In the case of livestock, the breed name is readily identified by the viewers, or if the livestock is grouped together according to breeds, one large sign to designate the group will be satisfactory. However, the award winners must be placed on the stall or pen of the individual winners for the duration of the Fair or Show, and in the case of poultry, entry tags showing species must be plainly exhibited on each coop and winning stickers must appear on such entry tags showing winners. Failure to comply with this regulation, will result in forfeiture of premiums. It will be the duty of the Fair or Show officials to see that this regulation is complied with. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair or show, which shall be supplied by the Fair free of charge.
11. DURING THE JUDGING, building except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone except fair officials, judges, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judge while making awards, shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.
12. ALL LIVESTOCK offered for premiums must be the property of the owners thirty (30) days or longer.
13. NO PERSON shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged, except the judge, Superintendents and necessary attendants.
14. SHOULD any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes, shall move into the next higher position, if in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
15. OVERFITTING of cattle will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
16. WHEN on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and in the charge of owner or employee.
17. JOINT OWNERSHIP considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
18. ALL LIVESTOCK exhibitors must make entry reservations with the department chairman no later than one (1) week preceding the fair (unless otherwise specified in department).
19. IN THE EVENT of no competition in any class, a ribbon and premium is awarded at the discretion of the Judges.
20. ALL EXHIBITORS must receive an entry number from the Fair Secretary when entering exhibit.
21. a. Livestock Exhibits must be entered Mon. 10am to Midnight.
b. Homeshow Exhibits must be entered Sun. 10am-7pm or Mon. 8am -12pm
22. FACTORY MADE exhibits will not be judged.
23. ANTIQUE quilts, spreads and other hope chest survivors will not be judged in competition for prizes. Such articles may be exhibited and ribbon awards made.
*24. NO HOMESHOW EXHIBITS may be removed before 8 pm on Saturday unless permission is received from the Department Head.
25. LIVESTOCK cannot be removed before 6 PM on Saturday without permission from the Fair Board or prizes will be forfeited.
26. EXHIBITS not removed by 10 PM Saturday evening will become the property of the Fair Assoc. unless arrangements have been made with the Secretary or President of the Fair.
27. ALL PREMIUM payments will be pro-rated if necessary
28. ANY QUESTION coming up not covered by the rules will be decided upon by the committee in charge and their decision will be final.
29. ENTRIES LIMITED to two entries per exhibitor per class number-except open class rabbits.
30. CAMPER PARKING is available $\$ 45.00$ per week. (Pay in advance - see form)
31. ALL EXHIBITORS must have their own liability insurance or make exhibits at their own liability risk.
32. ALL DELIVERIES must be made by 10 AM.

## ALL EXHIBITORS ~ PLEASE NOTE

The departments, classes, etc., in the Premium Book are prepared in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's desire to standardize a Premium Book for all Fairs. Read the Rules and Regulations carefully. Check each Department, Division, Section or Class in which you wish to enter any livestock or other exhibits for competition so that these entries will be properly classified. No department, which has been a part of the Cochranton Fair for years has been eliminated, but has been reclassified in accordance with the State's request.

## Guidelines For Care of Animals

## A. Restraining Animals

i. Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
ii. Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
iii. Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
iv. Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.
B. Handling - Any type of rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. The use of whips, canes, and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide the animals, not punish them.
C. Bedding - All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding such as carpeting is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.
D. Feeding \& Water - Animals should be well fed and have access to clean water regularly. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.
E. Transportation - Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.
F Blanket/Sweat Collars - Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking or lying down.
G. Health - It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

## Animal Health Regulations

The "Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship" form, a current negative "Coggins Test" for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within the past 12 months, a Rabies Certificate, and Influenza. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the last 30 days prior to the opening date is required. All paperwork must be presented upon arrival at the fair before animals are unloaded or you may mail copies of above paperwork with your entries. *No horse showing evidence of infectious, parasitic diseases, or any sign of an illness of any type will not be admitted to the fair.

## STALL DECORATING CONTEST

Theme: Farm, Families,Fairs, Fun
Stalls will be judged Thursday by show judge. Be creative and win a prize for the best decorated stall!

## RULES:

1. A $\$ 3.00$ entry fee per animal per class in all sections. (Fees must accompany the entry blank.)
2. All Animals must have Name of owner, name of animal, and an emergency number posted on their stalls with a copy of a current negative "Coggins Test", Rabies Certificate, and a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI).
3. All horses must be on grounds and signed in by 9 PM, Monday night and may not be removed until after 8 PM on Saturday, Any horse removed before 8 PM on Saturday will forfeit their premiums!!!
4. You may not unload your animals until Jennifer Loucks sees your current negative "Coggins Test" for EIA within the last 12 months, Rabies Certificate, Influenza, and Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued at least 30 days prior to fair opening.
5. No horse shall be entitled to premium unless serviceably sound.
6. No stallions shall be accepted for entry (except weanling foals for mare \& foal).
7. All horses entered must be shown.
8. Grand Champion \& Reserved Grand Champion classes will consist of winners from the previous classes for halter classes only.
9. Horses to be entered under one owner, ridden by one owner, and premiums will be made to the same.
10. NO sleeping in the horse barn, no exceptions.
11. Under NO CIRCUMSTANCES will any minor be allowed to stay overnight in a tent or camper without adult supervision. Camper fee is to be paid at the beginning of the fair.
12. Horses are to be in their stalls by 9:00 PM. Unless otherwise stated by Chairperson.
13. If you wish to ride in the parade we must ride up as a group and stay in a group at all times. See Chairperson for details.
14. Feeding is to be done by $\mathbf{1 0}$ AM and $\mathbf{1 0} \mathbf{~ P M}$ and you are required to keep your stall clean and presentable for the whole duration of the fair. Stalls should be cleaned prior to fair opening each day.
15. Horse tent is operated by Jennifer Loucks with assistance from Charley, Nichol, and Leonard Loucks; please direct any questions to them.

## Department 2 DAIRY CATTLE

## Chairperson: Elaine Duncan (Ph. 425-2302) 22610 Freyermuth Rd., Meadville, PA 16335 <br> HEALTH CERTIFICATION

## All cattle must have an official ear tag or breed registration tattoo.

No animal showing evidence of contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease shall be allowed entrance into the show.

All animals must be accompanied by an approved Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and bear unique permanent identification. This certificate must include a statement that the animal(s) identified have been immunized against IBR, P13, and BVD and be available at all times as additional inspections will be made.

Animals that have been vaccinated against BVD within the previous 12 months must receive at least a single injection of modified live virus or killed vaccine given not less than 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show.

Exhibitors must show written proof from their veterinarian that a dairy animal exhibited at the Cochranton Community Fair has had a rabies shot one time in its lifetime and not less than 30 days befor opening day of the current Fair year. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
IMPORTANT: The date of the last live virus vaccination or the dates of the last two killed virus vaccinations must be recorded on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. Hyperimmune serum may not be used as a substitute for the above vaccination.
PA CATTLE: No Tuberculosis test is required. No Brucellosis test is required.
OUT-OF-STATE:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation is required.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): (applies to states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months). An accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID will have a US shield and includes:
-A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag; or

- A 15-digit Animal Identification Number starting with " 840 " eartag; or
- Other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).

5. Testing: Tuberculosis Requirements:

- No test is required for animals originating from "Accredited Free" states or zones.
- All exhibition animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited Advanced" must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of
importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited" must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals to be imported (all ages) are test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).
- Rodeo (or other recreational) animals of all ages must be negative on an official Tuberculosis test within the 60 days prior to entry, unless they originate from and are members of an Accredited Tuberculosis-free Herd. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated sheep must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the C.V.I. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
a. Identification - Purebred animals must be identified by registry name and number, corresponding to the ear tag or tattoo number. Grade animals must be identified by farmflock number, corresponding to the ear tag or tattoo number.

IMPORTANT RULE: Certificate by the owner and an accredited veterinarian that the identified animal(s) is (are) not known to have been exposed to scrapie.
IMPORTANT RULE: All sheep must bear an official U.S.D.A./A.P.H.I.S. Eartag to be exhibited at the show. Sheep from flocks on the voluntary scrapie program must bear the official eartag, tattoo, or electronic ear implant.

~ CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION ~

This is written to clarify the use of Certificates of Veterinary Inspection for production agriculture animals present on fairgrounds during a Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture sponsored fair. The following principles apply:

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection are NOT REQUIRED for poultry, pigeons, rabbits and Guinea pigs. This includes animals in fair sponsored competitive events and noncompetitive exhibitions held on the fairgrounds during the fair.

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection must be executed on official Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, Certificate of Veterinary Inspection forms (AAI-13) provided by the department. Veterinary practice generated 'Health Certificates' are NOT acceptable.

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection must be marked "Exhibition" in block 1.
For destination in block 3, Purchaser/Name of Show/consignee, indicate "2018 Pennsylvania Fair Season" rather than the name of particular fair.

These Certificates are not valid for interstate movement unless they meet the requirements of the state of destination.

Certificates must be dated on or after May 1, 2018 are valid through the end of the 2018 Pennsylvania fair season with the exception of out of state animals.

Note - Were a veterinarian to have examined an animal for which a May 1 Certificate is valid for the entire fair season on or after May 1 and the veterinarian is comfortable that the thoroughness of that examination fulfills the obligations inherent in writing a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, the veterinarian may write a Certificate at a later date PROVIDED THAT it is dated as of the date of the actual examination rather than the date on which it is being written.

3. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection - An accredited veterinarian shall sign the statement of health on the AAI-13 test report that he examined the animal(s) within 30 days of issuance of the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (C.V.I.). All animals must be accompanied by the C.V.I. All animals must be individually identified on the C.V.I.

# Chairperson: Curtis Oakes (Ph. 425-8247), Co-Chairpersons: Kim Munden, Steven Bozinovich, Bryce Ward Entry Fee .30¢ All animals shall remain on premises until Saturday, 6 PM POULTRY HEALTH REQUIREMENTS 

1. All Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, and upland game birds entering an exhibition must bear an official PDA-issued leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons and doves must bear a unique individual identification leg band but do not have to be identified with an official PDA leg band.
2. An Owner-endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health certificate) must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites; and pigeons/doves; and hatching eggs. The certificate must include the following:
Name and location of exhibition; and
Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
A statement that the entries and the flock of origin are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases; and
Owner signature and date of that signature.
3. The following Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinary Consultation Relationship statement for the animals being exhibited must be included with a signature line for the owner or caretaker on the fair registration form: "I attest and affirm that a "veterinarian consultation relationship" - as that phrase is defined in the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Law found at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2501 et seq. and any amendments thereto - "exists with regard to any animals I will be exhibiting." The name and phone number of the consulting veterinarian must be included on the entry form. This statement is not needed if a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection accompanies the birds.
4. Avian Influenza Clean Testing and Verification (all samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian):

- All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites, (pigeons/doves excluded), and their hatching eggs for exhibition must originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 30 days prior to opening date of the exhibition. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs may be tested using PCR techniques. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in a tube for testing. Birds shall not be comingled with untested or AI-positive birds after negative samples have been collected and before the show.

5. Pullorum-typhoid Clean Testing and Verification (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded for exhibition). (All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian):

- Poultry, including chickens, turkeys, upland game birds and ratites (waterfowl excluded) and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in good standing on the NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean Program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) or from a flock in good standing on the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent NPIP 9-2 form or state equivalent form must accompany the birds or hatching eggs (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If birds are less than one year of age and originate from
an NPIP Clean hatchery, they do not have to be tested for pullorum-typhoid if they are accompanied by an NPIP 9-3 form from that hatchery and any additions to the flock were also from NPIP Clean sources. The NPIP number must be noted on the report for NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean flocks;


## OR

- All individual birds (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded) for exhibition (maximum of 300) must have had a pullorum-typhoid test within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report, or state equivalent form for the rapid test (copies acceptable). Test results must be negative. The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards:
- Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
- Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.
- Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.
- Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.
- All birds not meeting these age restrictions at the time of sampling are exempt from pullo-rum-typhoid testing requirements.
Recommendations to Reduce the Risk of Disease: Infectious Laryngotracheitis (ILT) Vaccination: All chickens for exhibition must be from flocks vaccinated against infectious laryngotracheitis no more than one (1) year and no less than thirty (30) days before the opening day of the show. The vaccine used must be one approved by the Department and must be administerd in full accordance with manufacturer's instructions.

1. All entries must be received before July 15. Send to Curtis Oakes, 6860 State Hwy. 173, Cochranton, PA 16314
2. Classes will be provided for all Bantams, Chickens, Ducks, Geese, and Turkeys listed in the American Standard of Perfection.
3. The management reserves the right to reduce the amount of entries accepted from one exhibitor.
4. All poultry will be judged according to the rules and regulations of the American Poultry Association.
5. Entries are limited - 25 cages available per exhibitor.
6. Exhibitors from Cochranton community area will be accepted first; if cage space permits additional entries will be accepted according to Dept. and Fairboard Regulations.

b. Uniformity in shape, size and color.
c. Be sure to pick out a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
3. Read premium material, carefully following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for 5 specimens, be sure to exhibit that number, do not enter 4 or 6 . In any instance, your exhibits will be disqualified if the correct number of specimens are not entered.
4. Entries such as root crops shall be displayed with tops off.
